Dear Friends,

Are you Irish? I am one-quarter Irish. My maiden name was McAllister. My dad's dad, William "Bill" McAllister, was 100% Irish, and was so proud of his heritage. I always think of him and remember him in the month of March. Growing up, I thought I never understood what St. Patrick's day was all about. As I grew up and learned more about my heritage, I found it fascinating. So today in memory of my Grandpa, I'd like to share with you a little bit about St. Patrick.

St. Patrick (who was originally from England) found great strength for his missionary work in Ireland through remembering his baptism. He wrote a song that appears in our hymnal (ELW 450) and is known as "St. Patrick's Breastplate" (i.e. St. Patrick's protection). It goes like this:

I bind unto myself today the strong name of the Trinity

By invocation of the same, the Three in One and One in Three.

I bind this day to me forever, by pow'r of faith, Christ's incarnation,

His baptism in the Jordan River, his cross of death for my salvation,

His bursting from the spiced tomb, his riding up the heav'nly way,

His coming at the day of doom, I bind unto myself today.

Christ be with me, Christ within me, Christ behind me, Christ before me,

Christ beside me, Christ to win me, Christ to comfort and restore me.

I bind unto myself the name, the strong name of the Trinity

By invocation of the same, the Three in One and One in Three,

Of whom all nature has creation, eternal Father, Spirit, Word.

Praise to the Lord of my salvation; salvation is of Christ the Lord!

It is said that St. Patrick used the shamrock as a way of teaching the concept of the Trinity—one God in three Persons. It would be great if every time we saw a shamrock this month, we could think about the great security we have in our relationship with God through our baptism. That, after all, is what the season of Lent is about—a time to reflect on what it means to be baptized children of God.

In the next several issues, we will print testimony from our 2014 Tanzania Mission Team which they shared at the outdoor worship service on August 17. Enjoy!

Imagine living in a place where less than 10% of the girl's even get the chance to attend a secondary school. Sadly, that's one of the statistics I found out about Tanzania. But I also learned that in their culture, a secondary education nearly triples a women's income, and she will reinvest about 90% of that income into her family. On our trip we were lucky enough to get the chance to visit a school that believes that if the women are educated, they will educate the whole village.


We arrived at the MaaSae Girl's Lutheran Secondary School, or MGLSS, just in time to attend evening chapel. We tried to sneak in and sit in the back, but of course a group of 10 white people sticks out a little bit. But as soon as we sat down, we were instantly making friends. Some of the older girls came and sat by us, and I don't mean just sat near the group. I mean they would come and squeeze their way in between us. Then chapel started; first it was the drumming, and then everyone stood up and started clapping different rhythms, dancing, and singing at the top of their lungs. It was one of the most remarkable things I've ever experienced. I enjoyed watching some of our team trying to participate in the singing and dancing, even though no one had any idea what they were doing. I think the girl's got a kick out of it too. And when it became time to pray, tons of girls were raising their hands because they all wanted to do the prayer! It was so impressive to see that.


The next day the girls had a "surprise" for us, so they took our hands and up the hill we walked. We were going to sort raw coffee beans from the coffee plantation near the school. Then the girls showed us their chickens and cows. Wendy started talking to the cows, and the cows seemed to respond. The girls thought that was hilarious. Next the girls showed us their dorms. Dani and I went into a room where a lot of the girls were hanging out together. They had so many questions for us, we shared some of our pictures with them, and they even found a song on my iPod that they knew, and they all started singing along to it!

That evening was our culture sharing night. We sang some songs, and did some dances, but the girls from the school definitely out-did us with their performances!

Our last day at MGLSS began with a long walk uphill to church with our hosts. Wendy referred to this as "climbing Mount Kilimanjaro". Later that day we walked to the market with our hosts, and ended the night sharing our last meal with our new friends. Since we would be leaving at 5am the next morning, this was also our chance to say goodbye to all the wonderful people who had been so welcoming and friendly to us. It was a tearful goodbye with lots of hugs, which kind of surprised me because before the trip, I had no idea how close we would grow with these people from across the world. Now I've learned the true meaning of the three small words on the backs of our shirts, "One In Christ."





The last relay we played is where you take a spoon and you run to a bowl of skittles and scoop some up with the spoon. Then you have to run or walk back with the skittles in the spoon and try to pour all your skittles into a water bottle without using your other hand. Let me tell you there was one particular chaperone, I won't say who, but she cheated and used her hand to put all her skittles into the water bottle!! It was a great afternoon with lots of laughs.

COMMUNION HELP NEEDED

The Altar Guild has responsibility for providing communion to the congregation. We need more church members who would be willing to help set up, serve, & clean up after communion

The actual serving of communion is usually done by two Pastors, two Communion Assistants, and two Acolytes. However, Altar Guild needs to provide at least two additional people to set up before communion, to help replace empty trays, and to clean up after communion. Males or females can be helpers. Some couples like to work together on this (just as some Communion Assistants are couples).

Set up is often done a day or two days before communion. It involves filling the plastic cups with wine and putting them in the brass wine trays. Prior to the worship service, certain items are put on the altar. There are detailed, typed instructions for doing this (as well as drawings to show placements on the altar) which you may

> Serving involves two people (one on each side of the altar area - one near the pulpit and one near the lectern) who each hold a filled wine tray to replace the wine trays that are emptied and filled with empty cups. They take the emptied cup trays to the Sacristy Room, & take the filled trays from the altar. The Pastors and Communion Assistants do the actual serving of wine and bread. The Acolytes collect the empty cup trays, which they pass back to the Altar Guild people, who pass the next filled wine trays to the Communion Assistants.

Clean up is usually done after each communion service. The Altar Guild helpers keep a written record of the number of people who take communion by counting the empty wine and juice cups as they are thrown away. They also have responsibility of putting away the brass wine trays and the other

items on the altar.

Judy Mouritsen, Cathy Neuman, and Sandy Pearson are currently the Altar Guild Members who are in charge of lining up people to help set up, serve, and cleanup for communion. Please call one of them or call Ashley in the Church Office (218-739-3348) if you would be willing to be a special communion helper. You can determine how frequently you want to help (e.g. twice a year, once a month, on certain holidays, whenever needed) and when you want to help (e.g. 1st or 2nd services, only summers, only in the fall, not during the winter months, etc.).

March is Food Shelf Month!

This month, First Lutheran is focusing our outreach efforts to help meet the needs of the people in our community through the Food Shelf. The Food Shelf is one of our local benevolences that helps so many people right in Fergus Falls.

FYI: The Food Shelf is open M-W-F and people are limited to visiting the Food Shelf one time per month; the Food Shelf is 100% volunteer based (including some of our members!); the Salvation Army takes all their left over fresh produce that cannot be held over until the next time they are open.

Let's come together and meet our goal of paying \$1,000 to the Food Shelf in March. If you would like to give to the Food Shelf, simply write "Food Shelf" on your offering check on the memo line.



This Lenten season, our congregation will again be participating in the "Buck a Chick" program through ELCA World Hunger Relief. A \$1 donation buys a chick for a family living in poverty. Once the chick begins producing eggs, the eggs provide nutrition to the family and/or can be sold at marketplace for income.

Our goal this year is 200 chicks. Do you know what 200 can do? On average, they could lay 1,050 eggs per week, 6,000 eggs during lent, and 54,750 eggs per year! Please consider donating to the "Buck-a-Chick" program through ELCA World Hunger. The sale will run March 9-April 20. You can purchase the chicks in the narthex at the "Buck-a-Chick" table, writing "Buck-a-chick on a check and placing in the offering., or stopping at the church office. Who knows, maybe we can get Pastor Saul to dress up like a chicken again!



FACING THE WILDERNESS... FINDING THE WONDERS

Our Lent/Easter Planning Task Force has once again come up with a wonderful theme for our Lenten Journey: Together: Facing the Wilderness... Finding the Wonders

You should all have received a brochure detailing the theme and the worship service opportunities during this season, but I would like to highlight here just the worship service on Easter Saturday, April 4 at 9pm, since I know that many of you have perhaps never attended an **Easter Vigil.** Let me answer some questions you may have about this service.

Q: Where did this service come from? Is it something new?

A: The Vigil of Easter is the oldest celebration in the church year, and was the original way the early Christians celebrated the Resurrection in an annual observance. In its present structure the Vigil dates to the early second century. The last 50 years has seen a rapid and vigorous recovery of this ancient celebration, and now many Lutheran churches observe it.

Q: Why does the service begin at 9 pm on "Easter Saturday"?

A: In Jewish worship tradition, the day begins at sundown. The 9 pm hour is a compromise between practical concerns and theological ones. (Daylight Savings Time adds another factor!) The actual resurrection took place sometime during the night between Saturday and Sunday, so this is a way to keep a vigil, and celebrate the miracle of Christ's resurrection.

Q: What are the four parts of the liturgy?

A: The Vigil consists of Light, Readings, Baptism, and Eucharist (Holy Communion).

Q: Describe what happens.

A: Light - We begin outside, gathered around a fire, where the large Paschal candle (representing Christ) is lit. We process with the candle into the dark sanctuary.

Readings - We listen to some of the great stories from the Bible, stories that remind us of God's powerful acts of salvation throughout history. We respond to the readings with beautiful hymns and canticles of praise.

Baptism - In the ancient church, the Vigil was the primary time to celebrate Baptism, since Baptism is the sacrament of being joined to Christ's death and Resurrection. Baptism is the Christians' passage from darkness to light, from guilt to grace, from burial with Christ to new life in his Resurrection. If there are no baptisms, we celebrate a renewal in our baptismal covenant.

Eucharist - Here is where we let out all the stops! The trumpets sound, the veil is removed from the cross, the lights come up bright, and dancers express for us the joy of the resurrection.

Easter day begins! The risen Christ is present in the

bread and the wine. We celebrate our salvation and union with Christ and one another as we receive the sacrament of Holy Communion.

Q: This sounds like an awful lot of church!

A: Although the Vigil service will take around 90 minutes, it is well worth it. I guarantee it will be one of the most meaningful worship experiences of your life. And the movement and variety involved make it a favorite with children, too. (You can always head to Perkins afterwards for some Easter dessert.)

Q: Is this just a passing fad?

A: Every Lutheran church I know that has begun to hold Vigil services continues to do so. I'm pretty certain that in 50 years, it will be hard to find an ELCA congregation that doesn't celebrate Easter Vigil.

Please invite your friends, bring the whole family, and celebrate with me on this most Holy night, Saturday, April 4, at 9 pm.
