A NOTE FROM PASTOR JENNIFER ROSE

Dear friends.

I really truly miss my grandparents, who all now rest in God's loving care. All four of them lived quite a distance from us growing up - we generally saw them twice a year at best. One summer, there were two family weddings and my parents let me, at 8 years old, stay with grandma Eunice for a few weeks in-between the weddings. I absolutely loved it. My grandma was an incredible cook. She loved to spend time with me and take me shopping. I always thought she was wealthy, even though she really wasn't. She just liked to (She had 5 spoil me. children, all boys, and I was her first grandchild a girl!) Grandma was a deeply faithful woman. She was active with the Bethel Bible Study series and learned how to be an instructor for other leaders. When she died, I inherited quite a few things from her: some of cookware, devotional books, and even some cross pendants that I like to wear sometimes on Sundays. Her memory lives on in my life, and I enjoy remembering her fondly as

I make a casserole in my home for my family, or as I pull a book off of a bookshelf, or as I prepare for worship.

I know you have stories like mine. The stories of our loved ones are begging to be told: the way she used to fold clothes, the silly story he told over and over, the look, the smile, the tears, the laughs. They may not be easy stories to relive because sadness now creeps into them, but healing is in the memories. Our loved ones are not forgotten. The book of Hebrews is a good reminder of that. It describes the faith of generation after generation, through Moses, Abel prophets, women, all who "gained approval through their faith." Until at last in chapter 12 we hear, "Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight and the sin that clings so closely, and let us run with perseverance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus the pioneer and perfector of our faith..." I like that image: our dear departed cheering us on as we live our lives. We learn from

their examples, we find courage in their faith, we hang on to the hope of being reunited - when there won't be a shred of sadness. But more than them cheering us on, one of the mysteries of our faith is that we're still connected to them. As we gather around the Lord's Supper we commune together, at the foot of the cross, with all the saints who have finished their journey before us. Our dear ones are far from gone. They still live in our memories and stories, still touch our hearts, still witness to God's love. And they live - fully, truly live - in God's presence. Strengthened





Then I want you to scan in this QR code. It will take you to a YouTube



Did you watch it? In the video, people were asked to think of an important person, write about the impact that this special person has made on their life, and then they are asked to call that person and tell them about how thankful they are. It wasn't an easy challenge for them, but they did it anyway. They discovered that each of them had a 4-19% increase in happiness as a result of this experiment.

What do you think? How would it be for you to call or text the person that you thought of at the start of reading this letter, and let them know about how much you appreciate them, and why? I know this is a hard challenge, but I also know that you are up for it.

Each of us has had special people in our lives that have helped shape us into the people we are. Many of us probably have more than one person in this category.

If you take me up on this challenge, send me a text and let me know how it went for you.

How did it feel? Was it hard?

How did you feel afterward?

This month, join me in giving thanks to God for our many blessings. We are truly blessed by our God who loves us so much!

I will give thanks to the Lord with my whole heart; I will tell of all your wonderful deeds. Psalm 9:1






















